
Playwriting Competition

"This was a very alternative piece of theatre," described by John Dylan:

"This production used a sound-tape only and we used just two white balls - of the ping pong variety - floating around seemingly by themselves in a blacked out environment. Sort of like Samuel Beckett's The Mouth / Not I. John Middleton - also of TV2 then - created the mechanics and electrics of the illusion. We toured it, (took it to Devonport once) and it almost started a fist fight in the audience afterwards between those who thought it was "an amazing experience" and those who were furious because they didn't get to see any actors and felt it was a load of utter rubbish - and said so very loudly!"

Theatre's birthday

Company Theatre celebrated its first birthday during its run of Blue Comedy at St Joseph's hall during April, not with a candle but with considerably more light than one candle-power.

Having done almost a dozen productions with lighting begged or borrowed from other organizations, and sometimes with no lights at all, Company investigated the cost of buying its own lights — and almost collapsed at the price.

Paying at least \$150 for one \$00 watt light was out of the question — so one very enterprising member, who just happened to be skilled at metalwork and electrical fitting, designed and built eighteen floodlights with which to illumine Blue Comedy.

Not just the usual makeshift light bulb in a biscuit tin, but anodized aluminium focusing floodights designed specifically for intimate theatre lighting. Another of Company's members who is an electronics friend is designing control equipment for the lights.

The lights, which also have holders for coloured filters and lenses, and which do not run as hot as traditional theatre lights, are available for hire from Company when they are not in use in their productions, and can be booked by phoning John Dylan on
