

INTRODUCING US

COMPANY THEATRE began in April 1980 when nine people gathered in a front room and decided to form a new-style theatre group - new, at least, to Auckland's North Shore. They all felt the need for something additional to existing dramatic outlets. Not competitive, but complementary.

So, COMPANY was formed, with the threefold aim of presenting as much good drama as possible; to take theatrical productions "to the people" as well as waiting for the people to come to the productions; and to allow its members freedom of expression and to encourage their creativity.

The logo which adorns COMPANY programmes was designed to represent the nine founder members as a circle or group, with a space for both people and ideas to pass freely in and out.

The first two years were extremely hard work! We had come to a suitable compromise between doing just the plays and styles of theatre that we had wanted to do in the past and had not had the opportunity to do, and doing the kind of productions that would bring us in a little money! And it was hard to stretch that minimal income to purchase and make the equipment that is generally so necessary to "do" theatre; lighting and control equipment, scenery, costumes and so on; and to keep up with ever-present administration and advertising costs. And we played egerywhere from the tiny Plunket Rooms to the Maidment Arts Centre. In short, we were a young group learning how to survive!

As we enter our third year, with over 50 financial members, we are very conscious of the fact that it will be a make-or-break year for us. We are devoting the first part of the year to fund-raising in the most pleasant ways we can (Pancake Parties and Champagne Breakfasts are decidedly pleasant! and to publicising ourselves as a friendly, sociable lot who enjoy having fun as well as working hard. And our four productions planned for 1982 (major ones opening in May, August and December, and a minor one in September) have been selected to appeal to a large number of people. And we MUST ensure good audiences if we are to approach 1983 with enough money and a large enough following to include all-the original and experimental drama to which many of us are dedicated.
