

☆☆ DIRECTOR'S NOTES ☆☆

It is a great pleasure to direct Company Theatre's official Tenth Birthday Production, and to be involved once again with "Not Now, Darling". When we first staged this play in 1982, I played Harry McMichael, and, despite this, the production was Company's first real box office success. Eight years later I am still laughing at the lines; a tribute both to the play and to the very strong cast you will be watching tonight.

"Not Now Darling" is a classic English farce. The storyline is, as it should be, wonderfully complicated and defies brief description. The characters are, in the main, thoroughly outrageous. If you like your theatre to be thought-provoking, meaningful and subtle, you are in for a big disappointment. If, on the other hand, you are simply looking for entertainment and a lot of laughs, then sit back!

The action of the play takes place in the private 4th floor salon of Bodley, Bodley and Crouch, an exclusive West-End firm of furriers, with an esteemed reputation. The hierachy of the company consists of three directors, Maude Bodley, her husband, Gilbert Bodley, and Arnold Crouch. Various members of the staff, clientele, their spouses, lovers and employees (or various combinations of the above) make up the rest of the cast.

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

☆☆ CAST NOTES ☆☆

Since his return to New Zealand from Australia and in the eighteen months he has been a member of Company, JOHN PALMER has now appeared for us in three acting roles, and a Music Hall; each a contrast with the others and each equally demanding. He is joined in the other principal role by JOHN STOUTLEY, who is better known to North Shore audiences for his musical roles and talents. However, John has previously appeared in "Not Now, Darling" as Arnold, as well as a number of other dramatic roles; also in Australia. Joining this 'international' cast, and in her second acting role is ANGELA REDMOND, who made her debut with Company in "Murder on the Nile", closely followed by an appearance in "Music Hall '89". MARGARET HEWITT, also a "Music Hall '89" trouper, joined Company as the formidable Sister Robertson in "Whose Life Is It Anyway?" in 1989. Well known to Company Theatre audiences as a Music Hall Chairman extraordinaire, GEOFFREY CLEWS has also made a number of acting appearances for us and, like the rest of the cast, is thriving on the chance to ham it up in his first truly comic role. It has been several years since SYLVIA McQUILKAN last appeared for Company, ("Mother Goose" and "Tomb With a View") and she makes a welcome return on this occasion. For a number of years WENDY KRISTENSEN has been a loyal member of Company Theatre and prior to her role in "Not Now, Darling", was previously a part of our music hall and pantomime productions and the play "Bonaventure". NEIL and YVONNE BURGHAM make another husband and wife appearance for Company Theatre. They last appeared on stage in 1988, once again in a Cooney/Chapman farce ("Move Over Mrs Markham"). MARK OSWIN ("Wait Until Dark" & "Murder on the Nile") and ADELAIDE JONES, a newcomer to Company, make up the remainder of the cast.

☆☆ THE DIRECTOR ☆☆

PETER SEGROVE defies description as a director, without resorting to all the cliches ever written about them. He needs no introduction to Company Theatre audiences (No.1) and we don't know where we'd be without him (No.2). A multi-talented performer (No.3) he has both acted and directed many times and, joined us first in 1982 for "They Came to a City" and, coincidentally, "Not Now, Darling". (That has to be No.4!). Since then the list of productions with which he has been associated continues to grow, as do his accomplishments (No.5). Peter stepped into the responsibilities of directing this production when the scheduled director was unable to take up the offer. But, (to be serious for a moment) (No.6?) it is in a sense fitting that he should do so. No one has worked harder for us over recent years and who better to take on our tenth anniversary production. We owe a big debt to Peter's energy and enthusiasim and have a corresponding concern for his sanity!



Triangle with twist

The path of true lust never runs smoothly, as the latest production from the Company Theatre shows.

Not Now Darling is typical English bedroom farce involving the standard love triangle with a twist.

Harry McMichael marries striptease dancer Janie and the whole play centres on her intentional infidelities.

Ray Cooney and John Chapman wrote the play 30 years ago. It was performed by the Company Theatre for its opening season 10 years ago.

"It is to mark our tenth anniversary. The show was such a hit then and we expect it to be the same this time around," says Geoff Clews, who plays Harry. Angela Redmond plays Janie.

"It is a laugh a minute. I know that sounds trite but the constant flow of movement between the characters is wonderful."

Justice rules in the end when all the characters get their just desserts.

"That is fun to watch and really keeps you on the edge of your seat," says Geoff.

Geoff enjoys playing Harry, a character he says is far removed from himself. "He really develops throughout the play but the real excitement for me is acting someone who is so unlike myself."

Not Now Darling starts tonight at the St Michaels Hall, Bayswater.
