

EIL BURGHAM

Neil's family on both sides had some involvement in music or amateur theatre and it was this background which saw him pursue an early career in radio. In the early sixties, whilst working as a music programmer/producer in New Plymouth, Neil took part in a number of New Plymouth Operatic Society productions as a singer/dancer.

On his return to New Zealand from a period overseas. Neil settled on the North Shore in 1967. Because of the demands of a home and young family, he limited his artistic involvement to singing in the Auckland Choral Society until 1982 when he and his wife joined Company Theatre for their production of "Blythe Spirit".

Since that time Neil has appeared in several 'Company' plays (DEAR DEPARTED, MOVE OVER MRS MARKHAM. NOT NOW DARLING, WHY ME) as well as pantomime and music hall productions. In between, he directed FIFTY FIFTY, WHOSE LIFE IS IT ANYWAY and WAIT UNTIL DARK. A move to Parnell last year saw Neil take up an offer to direct Howick Little Theatre's production of VIA SATELLITE

IRECTOR'S NOTE

Having enjoyed very much the TV production of William Nicholson's "Shadowlands", I was particularly keen to read "Map of the Heart" when it appeared on a list of new releases. Company Theatre had been looking for a strong drama for some time and all agreed that this could be the one.

Because it deals with somewhat emotional subjects, this kind play was always going to be a challenge - how to resist the temptation to overplay these aspects of it being the most difficult. The three principal characters find themselves in situations which they neither looked for nor cope with very

well and Nicholson's understatement of the emotion is interwoven with a typically British selfmocking humour with which he occasionally lightens the drama. The cast and I have enjoyed analysing the quite complex characters of the Steadman family and the two principal protagonists with whom they come into contact.

When we first considered MAP OF THE HEART, we were somewhat daunted by the number and variety of scene changes and I was very fortunate to be able to talk Peter Fitzgibbon (who very successfully provided the technical direction for WAIT UNTIL DARK) into looking after the technical design for this production. I trust our combined efforts will provide you with an enjoyable theatrical experience.


Catherine was acting with repertory groups all over the North and South Islands until the child rearing years forced her into a sustained period of silence (for probably all of 15 minutes). She first performed with Company in 'Murder in Company', 'Habeas Corpus' and now as Ruth in 'Map of the Heart'.

This is the second outing for **Max** with Company, the first being last year in 'Habeas'. Although not having been intently involved with theatre for several years, his association with theatre dates back to early childhood. His involvement has included production, stage management, administration, props, lighting, sound and, of course, acting.

At the age of 19, **Bronwyn** has played a variety of roles in many theatrical productions, ranging from Aunt Dolly in 'Footrot Flats' to Marty in 'Grease;. Her most recent role was that of Shannon in the Rose Youth Theatre's production of 'A Time to Laugh' in May. 'Map of the Heart' is Bronwyn's first show with Company.

John joined Company in 1989 and has made various and assorted appearances with us since. He claims he hasn't had to wear a dress or nappies yet, but has done just about everything else. John directs, helps backstage, acts, sings and dances – and thought he could play the piano. Two out of five ain't bad!









Sherry joined Company in 1991 and has appeared in varied roles from Music Hall to comedy. Her Cleaning Lady in "Habeas Corpus" is generally accepted as having redefined both words. Like Mary Hanlett, Sherry is self-employed in the "real world", but the only crusading she does is to stop children being allowed home from school at the ridiculously early hour of 3.00pm!

Jeff Marsh joined Company back in 1992 – to assist with back stage work and lighting, he last trod the boards in the mid eighties. This is his first role for Company.

Having been a professional musician and entertainer for many years, **Matthew** is no stranger to live performance. He also has experience as stage manager and it was with this in mind that he approached Company in 1992. Instead, he has found himself on stage in 'Beside the Sea', 'Cowardy Custard' and now this current production. Perhaps he might be allowed to be stage manager next year?

Hard bitten, cold hearted, manipulative? **Moira** is none of these, but in playing June she shows how far she has advanced as an actress since her dramatic debut as the ingenue in 'Murder in Company' in 1992. Moira is also saddled with the unofficial position of Company's choreographer, due to her remarkable moves.



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Hostage drama takes the stage

The drama of a hostage situation is the basis of the Belmont Company Theatre's latest production. Map Of The Heart.

Written by British playwright William Nicholson, the play is best described as contemporary drama.

Central characters Ruth (played by Catherine Long) and Albie (played by Max Golding) are in their mid-40s and trying to cope with the stresses of a strained marriage.


Albie, a medical doctor, accepts a posting to the Sudan where he becomes involved in a political hostage situation.

Director Neil Burgham says although hostage-taking is not a current feature of world events, it is still recent enough to lend drama to this play.

"But that's not the real drama," says Mr Burgham. "That comes more subtly from the deteriorating relationship of the couple who are facing an all-too-common crisis," he says.

The New Zealand premiere of Map Of The Heart opens with a gala champagne performance on November 13, at 8pm. Tickets are \$15.
