

# The Play: A synopsis of The Odd Couple.

Olive, a prime time T.V. producer, is living in cheerful chaos in her city apartment. At Olive's invitation, the newly separated Florence, moves in and is soon finding comfort in cooking, cleaning and fussing, until Olive is almost reduced to a nervous wreck. It soon becomes clear that the patterns of their marriages are beginning to re-occur.

Other characters include their 4 school friends and the arrival of two extremely comic Spanish brothers from the apartment upstairs.



Maggie Maxwell was for some time a member of the Mercury Theatre Company and has worked at both Theatre Corporate and Independent Theatre (but says she is not responsible for their demise!). Maggie is a skilled reader of prose and poetry and performs regularly Director around Auckland, and also records talking books for the Blind. She will appear in August in "Cosmic Dust", a programme of readings and music for The Pumphouse lunchtime series. Maggie is currently working on the guest role of Barbara Winchester in "Shortland Street". She has worked as a freelance casting director for film and television and is a teacher of screen acting

She has directed many productions from solo performances to productions in Spanish for the University of Auckland's Spanish Department. Directing is now her major focus.

"If Broadway ever erects a monument to the patron saint of laughter, Neil Simon Neil Simon would have to be it" wrote Time magazine. The movies and television might consider America's most prolific and popular playwright a patron saint as well. He has written 28 plays and holds the record for the greatest number of hits in the American theatre. He has had more plays adapted to film than any other playwright, and additionally has written nearly a dozen original film comedies. He helped define television comedy during the medium's legendary early days( He helped make Phil Silvers, Jackie Gleason and Garry Moore, sound funny.) In the theatre, at the movies, and at home, he has kept America and the world, laughing for more than 40 years and has been rewarded with four Tony Awards, two Emmys, a Screen Writer's guild Award and a Pulitzer Prize.

What is his secret? Perhaps the secret to his success is his ability to show us, - between, in and around the funny lines - the pain, aspiration, and sheer panic behind all of his unforgettable characters.

Maggie Maxwell, directing Neil Simons The Odd couple for Company Theatre has taken the adventurous step of moving the play into an Auckland Apartment in 1997.

"New Zealanders are only just becoming aware of the positives and pitfalls of apartment dwelling," she said. "In other world cities, apartments have formed the major part of housing stock for generations. Translating a play set in a New York apartment for Aucklanders might have proved impossible ten years ago, but the apartment boom here has meant it can now be credibly undertaken."

The play's lead characters, Olive Madison and Florence Unger are two unlikely friends thrown together in an accident of circumstances. They represent opposite poles in the house pride scale. Florence descends upon

her friend Olive and begins to exercise on Olive's apartment and life, all the obsession for order and tidiness which has contributed to her recent separation from husband, Sidney. The Odd Couple opens next Saturday April 5 at the Belmont Rose Centre.
