



THE PLAYWRIGHT- David Williamson

Born in Melbourne in 1942; has a degree in Mechanical Engineering; lectured in thermo-dynamics and social psychology until 1973, when he was voted most promising playwight, following the British production of **The Removalists**. Since then he has had numerous box office hits around Australia, London & Los Angeles, including **Don's Party, Gallipoli** & **Travelling North**. He lives in Sydney with his journalist wife Kristin, and four children. *Money and Friends* was first produced in Brisbane in 1991. It played at the Circa, Wellington in 1996. Williamson is said to be Australia's most successful comedy playwight.

THE DIRECTOR - Sherry Ede

This is Sherry's second major production, as Director, for Company Theatre (The Mad Mad World of Theatre, '94). In 1994, she received a Theatre Federation Merit Award for Best Director in the North Island Final of The One Act Play Festival. Since then she has directed and acted in, three seasons of Arthrob Comedy Theatre for the Devonport Art's Festival & was last seen on stage for Company as Sylvie, in the female version of The Odd Couple in '97. An Australian, who has been here 11 years, she is delighted to direct a show which she says has great dialogue; acute observation of character; is clever, witty, and entertaining, yet thought provoking.

SCOTT THOMAS - Lighting Design

Scott has been interested in the technical side of theatre since his school days, having been involved with drama and musical societies in Christchurch, Rotorua, Kapiti Coast and the North Shore. He is currently involved with a number of local groups helping with set building, stage managing and his main interest of lighting design.

SYNOPSIS

The play is set in *Crystal Inlet*, a beachside resort, on the coast of NSW, where four couples escape from the pressures of city life. It is the summer of 1991, a few years after the most severe economic depression in Australia, for 60 years. Banks lost a fortune and the property market dropped dramatically. Comparisons with New Zealand in 1998 can be made.

The two central characters, *Peter* and *Margaret*, are in grief and bitterness at the loss of their respective partners. They share a genuine friendship, made all the more interesting because it is between a man and woman. Other characters are married but do not really seem to be friends. The difficulty of maintaining friendship within marriage is a recurrent theme in Williamson's plays. The three couples (*Alex & Vicki; Stephen & Penny; Conrad & Jacqui*) have been dubbed "the awfuls" by one reviewer. During the play they are tested by some home truths and their reactions vary, but ultimately nearly all (except *Penny*) remain completely selfish. One of Williamson's lines in the play says, despite their selfishness... "their fallibility makes them all the more endearing." *Are* they just a product of their society, perhaps? Is that an excuse? The topics "*Money*" and "*Friendship*" - have been major and perennial themes for playwrights, since before Shakespeare. This play is an entertaining interpretation of those ideas in the 90's, - from an Australian (New Zealand?) perspective.
