At Selwyn College, she has appeared in 'Anything Goes', 'Flapper, King of the Castle' and 'The Promise'. With Auckland Children's Musical Theatre she has appeared in 'Oliver' and in 'Joseph and his Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat'.

LESLEY LOCKE

Although Lesley has acted, and more recently directed in most theatre groups round Auckland, she was delighted to be offered the role of Evelyn as her debut for Company Theatre at The Rose Centre. "This has been an exciting production to be involved in" says Lesley," and I hope

As an actor Lesley maintains that we can learn something new in every role, and Evelyn is a most complex character. She has found portraying her to be a wonderful challenge.

This is Jo's first appearance with Company Theatre following three plays at Dolphin Theatre where she played the drunken Suzette in "Don't Dress for Dinner', (Best Actress award), Sally Chesington in 'Cash on Delivery' and Ruby Birtle in 'When we are Married', (Best Supporting Actress Award). Jo is enjoying the change from playing in farce and comedy to managing the emotions and mood swings of Evelyn's confused and distraught daughter Faith.

DAVID FITCHEW

David first worked with Graham Wagstaff when they met inside the elephant for the Auckland season of 'Phantom of the Opera'. David's theatrical career spans over 50 years and ranges from playing a 14 year old butler's boy in an Ian Hay farce to 90 year old Firs in' The Cherry Orchard 'for Company Theatre. In 1938, around 10,000 Jewish children were sent to England from Europe to escape

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increasing persecution by the Nazis. Once in England, they were adopted and many became naturalised British, preferring to forget their pasts and knowing they may never see their parents again. Such a person is Evelyn on whom the plays centres. Now in her 50's and with a daughter Faith in her twenties, we learn her story through a series of dramatic flashbacks, from her leaving

her parents in Germany, through her journey to England in the Kindertransport, and her adoption by her foster mother Lil now in her 80's. Having renounced her past, she finds herself at odds with her daughter who only discovers her mother's background during the course of the play.
