Ghostly goings on at the Rose Centre

One night in the 1920's Arnold Ridley who played Private Godfrey in the wartime sitcom Dad's Army, was sitting on the platform at Man-gotsfield station near Bristol in the UK.

He sat for four hours waiting to change trains from the Avon Valley Line to the Midland mainline, when strange acoustics made the trains on one platform sound as if they were passing along the other platform. This set his mind off and during his wait he wrote the classic comic mystery The Ghost Train.

A dark and stormy night, winter 1925. In the dingy waiting room of Fal-Vale station in Cornwall, six passengers have missed their connection. Now they are stranded until the following morning, on tonight of all nights.

Into this one room the characters have been brought by the foolish actions of Teddie Deakin who pulled the emergency cord, bringing their train to a sudden halt. The station master tells them a tale of 20 years earlier when a railway accident resulted in death, madness and haunting - " it be said that to look on the ghost train means death".
