

CAST PROFILES

Jacqué Mandeno – A drama teacher by day, Jacqué enjoys going over to the "other side" to show that teachers *can* do. To that end, she has directed and acted in many local productions. Her favourite roles tend to be pantomime-style villains so it is a great challenge to do a "straight" role for a change. Having known Roger Hall many years ago in Dunedin, it is a great pleasure to be acting in one of his plays, and to be working with such a marvellous cast and crew.

John Curry – Despite having trodden the boards for many years now this is only John's second time at Company Theatre, his previous outing was playing Sterling in 'The Ghost Train'. Last year he also played a retired General who became a hippy in 'Halfway Up The Tree' with ShoreSide Theatre. John says he is thoroughly enjoying his time in the Wairarapa with his fellow cast members.

Dianne Lamont – Dianne returns to the stage after acting in management training videos and in 'Orange Roughies' an upcoming drama series on TV One. Playwright Roger Hall's 'Middle Aged Spread' introduced Dianne to the role of Elizabeth in the 70's. All these years later, Elizabeth is still defining herself through her family's achievements. In 'Spreading Out' disappointment lies ahead – a role to relish.

Michael Posner - Michael trained at The Guildhall School Of Music & Drama in the Barbican, London. Upon leaving he co-formed a comedy act called 'The Identical Quads' which achieved great success on the London alternative comedy scene. Since arriving in New Zealand he has appeared in Legacy Shakespeare Co.'s al fresco production of 'As You Like It' at The Parnell Rose Gardens and played the central character, Arnold, in 'Torch Song Trilogy' at The Lopdell House Theatre. Max Golding – This is Max's fourth show for Company Theatre at The Rose Centre, having first appeared in 'Habeus Corpus' the original Company production here – some time last century! Latterly he has been on stage at the Stables Theatre (Gaston in 'Picasso at the Lapin Agile') and Dolphin Theatre (Sir Robert Morton in 'The Winslow Boy'). 'Spreading Out' is the first time he and Sue have actually appeared on stage as husband and wife – and what an outcome!

Sue Golding - Sue's recent acting has been with Dolphin and Stables Theatre groups. Most recent performances: East-European Freya in 'Body Language' and Grace Winslow in 'The Winslow Boy' (Dolphin Theatre 2005 Best Female Performer) plus Constance in 'The Constant Wife' and Italian diva Eleanora Duse in 'The Ladies of the Camellias' at Stables Theatre. Isobel has provided an interesting challenge to portray – definitely acting against type!

Elizabeth McGlinn – This is Elizabeth's first time on stage with Company Theatre. She has appeared at The Pumphouse and in a number of productions at The University of Auckland including playing Juliet in 'Romeo and Juliet'. Elizabeth took time out from her Marketing & Media Studies at Uni to travel and act in an American TV series that was shot in Wellington.

SPREADING OUT

by Roger Hall

This sequel to the highly popular 'Middle Age Spread' of the 1970's plunges us into mid- life career crisis, terminal illness and impending divorce, all gloomy topics in any family. How we personally deal with these life-changing events, how we communicate them to those dear to us and how we save ourselves from suffering in the process, this is all portrayed through the very strong characters in Roger Hall's black comedy of bad manners and bad taste.

Being essentially English with no family in New Zealand, I frequently ask myself 'Where is Home?' 'What is it that attracts me to New Zealand?' For each and every one of us, the lure of this wonderful country is very different and very personal, it can cause conflict and tension, yet the overriding emotion is that it allows us to be 'free'.

The actors have enjoyed examining the issues for young, middle aged and ageing New Zealanders on their voyages of self discovery.

Director's Profile

This is the sixth production Kathy has directed for Company Theatre, the most recent being another Roger Hall play 'Take A Chance On Me'. preceded by 'Three of a Funny Kind', 'Blithe Spirit', 'See How They Run' and 'Straight & Narrow'.

As a director with several groups in the UK, her productions there included 'Cabaret', 'Stepping Out', 'Rebecca', 'Charley's Aunt', 'When We Are Married', 'Chorus of Disapproval', 'Lord Arthur Savile's Crime' and 'Bedroom Farce'. She loves directing comedy, paying particular attention to timing and characterisation.
