AN IDEAL HUSBAND - Director's Notes

What if life were good? What if, after a spectacular career - a moment from your past came back to haunt you - and threatened to ruin it all?. What if everything is at stake? What would you do if someone tried to take away your wealth, power, status, respectability, and perhaps worst of all - those who love you?. Sir Robert Chiltern faces this challenge in the play "An Ideal Husband", and his wife Lady Chiltern, his friend Arthur Goring, and nemesis Mrs Cheveley all play their part in this unravelling.

What ultimately is important in a relationship, career and friendship? How do we value our friends and when do we challenge those we love? What is the role of loyalty?

What attracts someone to direct Oscar Wilde is undeniably the wonderful language. Everyone who knows Oscar Wilde is excited about the text, and the astonishingly refreshing way of looking at society. What attracted me, beyond the language was the relevance to everyday life in Auckland, New Zealand, almost 120 years after it was first performed. After further research into the play, opportunities for sumptuous costuming, dynamic set and special effects presented themselves. The characters are three dimensional and face different problems so they each move through different arcs over the course of the play.

Even from the moment of audition, I felt myself to be enormously lucky with the talent that is within the cast. From then on, with a great script, we had a wonderful opportunity to tell a story of people just like you and I. People living their lives, with assumptions, joy, pain and hope; each telling their own tale of love.

Perhaps it was co-incidence that the media and local politicians have provided us with ample fodder for reflecting on the currency of politics in society, during the time of our preparation of this play. But, maybe Wilde's point is exactly that – that politics are always dramatic, turbulent and often whimsical.

It isn't just playwrights, actors and directors who make plays, there is a whole team of people who create the suspended reality of fiction. We are all grateful for everyone's efforts.

OSCAR WILDE - Playwright



Oscar Wilde's own life was a play. His challenge to society came first in his unusual command of language, and ability to describe and characterise those around him. He also challenged the assumptions that people make, about themselves and each other. While married with children, he found himself trapped in a world where expectations limited freedom of expression. Championing the cause of those he loved, and not one to shy away from tackling social issues head on, Wilde was ultimately tried under laws forbidding homosexual activity.

It is only recently that gay marriage has become legal in New Zealand, and so we see the tremendous strength of character that Wilde showed by taking on the justice system of the time, 1895. Wilde's work is funny. He has such a lightness of touch, an irony, a cleverness with words that sometimes we can listen and forget his very real message.

He paid dearly for his passions. He died estranged from family, living in self-imposed exile in France, having served two years of hard labour for following his own path. Even so, his legacy is that he encourages us all to follow our own path.

Act One: We are in the Chilterns' home. They are hosting friends at a party. Sir Robert Chiltern is an important politician, his wife Lady Gertrude Chiltern is in the Women's Liberal Association – a group that campaigned strongly for Women's Suffrage. All is well, until a stranger, Mrs Cheveley, enters the party, and starts to cause trouble. We soon learn of her intent to blackmail Sir Robert by threatening to reveal secrets of his past life.

Act Two: The next day in the Chilterns' lounge. Lord Arthur Goring, who is Sir Robert and Lady Chiltern's dearest friend is trying to help Robert deal with a tricky situation. Arthur has love troubles of his own. He is distracted by his paramour Mabel Chiltern (Robert's sister). Mrs Cheveley then arrives back at the Chilterns, and challenges Lady Chiltern as to how well she knows her husband implying he may not be the ideal, moral man she thinks he is. Feeling distraught, Lady Gertrude appeals to her husband, and he has to admit he has lied to her.

INTERVAL – There will be an interval of 15 minutes. Refreshments are available in the foyer.

Act Three: That evening, in Lord Goring's rooms. Arthur is keen to go out, but visits by his father (Lord Caversham), then an unexpected Mrs Cheveley and then Sir Robert thwart his plans. He ends up in a very compromising situation, coming face to face with his own past through Mrs Cheveley.

Act Four: The next day, back at the Chilterns' home. A potential promotion is in the air, but decisions have to be made about a future in politics after the humiliating events of the past 48 hours. Robert again turns to Arthur Goring for advice. It all looks like it might end well, but there is a further twist before happiness can be won, with a proposal, an acceptance and a new start.


Stephen Hood
