NOEL COWARD'S HAY FEVER

Best described as a cross between high farce and a comedy of manners. Hay Fever is set in an English country house in the 1920s. It revolves around the four eccentric members of the Bliss family and their outlandish behaviour when they each invite a prospective lover to spend the weekend unbeknownst to the others.

The Blisses and their two equally unconventional children live in a world where reality slides into fiction. Upon entering this world, the unfortunate weekend guests are repeatedly thrown into melodramatic scenes wherein their hosts profess emotions and react to situations that do not really exist. The resulting comedic chaos only ends when the tortured visitors tip-toe out the door.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE



JULIAN HARRISON

This is Julian Harrison's first production for Company Theatre. He has directed extensively throughout Auckland including a very successful production of Looking at Dolphin Theatre earlier this year. He also directed I hate Hamlet & Take a Chance on Me at Stables Theatre last year as well as picking up Howick Little Theatre's 'show of the year' award the last two years running.



Company Theatre Presents Hay Fever A 1920's comedy by Noel Coward, Directed by Julian Harrison

Noel Coward wrote Hay Fever in 1924 and it was first performed in 1925. He based it on a Bohemian theatrical family, and always envisaged "a great star" in the lead role... starting with Marie Tempest, then sixty years, who was as theatrical as you can get, having moved from opera to comedy. Felicity Kendall plays the role in the current London revival of this classic. Coward himself said that the play has no plot and few witty lines. However it gives everyone on stage a chance to ham it up hilariously, and it always seems to work.

Stage star Judith Bliss, her novelist husband and their two grown children Sorel and Simon have each invited houseguests for the weekend. But as the Blisses indulge their artistic eccentricities in an amusing whirlwind of flirtation and histrionics, the guests begin to wonder if they've landed in a madhouse – and if they can survive the weekend with their own wits intact. Misjudged meetings, secret seductions and scandalous revelations proliferate during one outrageous weekend in Berkshire.

Company Theatre's production of Hay Fever is directed by the experienced Julian Harrison. Company Theatre at The Rose Centre promises a talented cast, a period set, sumptuous costumes and the warmest of welcomes. Back on the boards... Liz Philipps

Sophisticated wit, comedic chaos and melodramatic manners

Company Theatre's upcoming production Hay Fever is one of the funniest of Noel Coward's plays and epitomises the sophisticated wit of the era between the two world wars.

It's a comedy of (very bad) manners, about a family whose theatrical excesses torment a group of unsuspecting visitors.

Inspired by a weekend he spent at the house of the actor Laurette Taylor, Coward wrote the play in just three days.

Upon its 1925 London debut, it won praise from both audiences and critics, considered by many to be cleverly constructed, wittily written, ever so slightly cynical and undeniably entertaining.

The Bliss family includes Judith, an actress in late middle age who is finding retirement in the country very dull indeed, her husband David - who writes very dull novels in his private den upstairs and two bohemian children who squabble and tear

each other's hair out.

The plot revolves around four visitors - a proper diplomat, a shy flapper, an athletic boxer and a fashionable sophisticate, each invited by a family member for a weekend in the country. The trouble is that none of the family has told the others about these guests, there isn't any food in the house and there aren't enough bedrooms. Melodramatic scenes

ensue and the play ends in comedic chaos.

Company Theatre pays great attention to detail with the 1920s. style set and sublime costumes designed by Cathie Sandy and the talented cast under Julian Harrison's direction are wonderfully larger than life.

Julian is a real aficionado of Hay Fever having acted in it 18 vears ago at drama school and then 10 years ago he directed the play with teenage students at Howick Children's and Youth Theatre. He promises audiences of this current production "an evening of glamour and laughter".

The play runs for two weeks from August 8-22 at The Rose Centre in Belmont, with the opportunity on Flapper Friday -August 14 - for audiences to join in the fun by dressing up in 1920s costume.
