Max Golding

Max is an Auckland born Kiwi who was trained in theatre from an early age. As a theatre practioner he has worked principally as an actor but has undertaken many jobs from administration, production and all aspects of off stage work. Over the last couple of decades he has mainly confined his involvement to on stage roles, regularly appearing with many Auckland community theatres.

His first involvement with Company Theatre was in 1992 when he played the role of Dr Arthur Wicksteed in "Habeus Corpus" (the first play to be staged in the Rose Centre). Since then he has appeared from time to time more recently as Alan in "Who Wants to be 100?" (2010), Adrian in "Four Flat Whites in Italy" (2011) and his latest role being that of Richard Greatham in "Hay Fever" (2015).

Max and his wife Sue have their own theatre company, MSM Theatre, which has staged two shows in the Rose Centre, "Talking Heads" and "We're Strangers Here". Both of these subsequently toured to other venues. Since then they have staged other plays in other theatres.

Director's Note

This is one of David Williamson's most recent plays and it has toured all over Australia. One of his usual style of satirical comedies it poses a number of questions to ponder.

What rights do children have to inheritance and more so if the parents are self made? Is it not the right of any person, old or young, to dispose of their money as they so desire?

What is to be despised in Western civilization's old Christian values, and which parts of this will we keep or throw aside as we move on?

What power do the great majority of the world's individual citizens still have now that over sixty percent of global resources are controlled by only 150 companies?

Income disparity is now worse than before the introduction of the welfare state in the 1920s.

By exhibiting the weird and not wonderful antics of the ignorant yet powerful and privileged, David Williamson makes comedy and comment out of recent and current events including the very peculiar twists and turns of contemporary American politics and religion.

And we all know that where there's a will there's likely to be a terrible family row brewing.

The Playwright

This is the fourth production of a David Williamson play by Company Theatre the "Money previous being Friends" (1998), "Brilliant Lies" (2002) and "Up for Grabs" (2004).

Born in Melbourne in 1942 he started writing plays in 1967. He is the most produced playwright in the history of Australian Theatre and has recently had his 50th play staged at The Ensemble Theatre in Sydney.



His plays are regularly revived by both professional and community theatre groups. They have been translated into many languages and performed internationally including major productions in London, New York, Los Angeles and Washington.

David has also written numerous film scripts (some of them based on his most popular plays) and several television series.

Audiences love him, partly because he takes on elitist worlds with a sharp eye and a bias toward the Australian everyman. With a similar outlook on issues his plays resound well here.

His most popular plays are his satirical comedies. He believes if he can get audiences rolling in the aisles with laughter he can get his social messages on board subconsciously. But he has written a very broad spectrum of plays and is the recipient of many awards, being named as one of Australia's Living National Treasures.

Dianne can't keep away from the stage and lights

When Dianne Lamont was killed off as Mrs Boyle in Company Theatre's production of *The Mousetrap* four years ago, she thought it was the end of her stage career,

But now she is back, aged 80, playing Judy, a victim of failed investments in *When Dad Married Fury* by David Williamson, now showing at the Rose Centre.

Lamont became interested in theatre at school, where she was a member of the St Mary's College senior choir under Dame Sister Mary Leo, and appeared in lead roles in Othello and Hamlet. After sitting speech and drama exams, she qualified as a librarian then worked as a 'radio personality' presenting women's programmes in New Zealand before going to London, where she acted with Questors Theatre in Ealing. Back in Devonport, she worked as the librarian at the Naval Base, retiring as Command Librarian after 12 years of service.

Lamont first lived in Devonport in the late 1950s, when she recalls a stint as a fashion model for the "shorter woman". After living in Wanganui, she returned to Devonport in 1986. She has played lead roles as Maria in New Zealand's first production of *West Side Story* and as St Joan in George Bernard Shaw's *St Joan*. Her favourite roles have included Helene Hanff in *84 Charing Cross Road* and Lady Bracknell in *The Importance of Being Earnest*. She has also worked in TV and film. In the last 20 years Lamont has appeared in 11 plays with Company Theatre. She loves the Company's choice of plays, from popular comedies to classic dramas, both as an actress and member of the audience.

Lamont is an admirer of David Williamson's work, so she leapt at the opportunity to appear in *When Dad Married Fury*, a thought-provoking tragi-comedy about money and marriage. "It is a recently written play on a topical subject, and while set in Australia, is very relevant to modern-day New Zealand', she said. When not acting, Lamont is a keen member of the Devonport Walkers and loves yoga classes at the Community House.
