

Kathy Gent

This is the eleventh play that Kathy has directed for Company Theatre, her most recent productions being Fawlty Towers, More Fawlty Towers, Calendar Girls, Brassed Off and 'Allo 'Allo. She loves directing comedy and feels quite at home with the pantomime and farce of One Man Two Guvnors having directed revues, musicals, pantomimes and dramas for groups in Leicester, Sheffield, Portsmouth and London before joining Company in 1995.

Director's Note

Just over a year ago One Man Two Guvnors became available for amateur theatre groups and I laughed myself silly at a play reading we held to explore the possibility of staging a production. Richard Bean the playwright adapted The Servant of Two Masters by Carlo Goldoni, relocating the setting from 1740's Florence to 1963 Brighton and finding a British style of theatre comparable to Commedia del Arte which has its origins in improvisation, includes song and dance and has themes of old age, jealousy, love and adultery. Never thinking we could emulate the National Theatre's version I saw at the Auckland Arts Festival in 2013, I was however certain that the intimate setting of the Rose Centre was the perfect venue for a show that requires audience participation, a cast/band ensemble and a company of actors sympathetic with the traditions of English farce, slapstick, music hall and pantomime.

We have become a tightly knit group partly because of the improvisation, physical theatre, theatrical fighting workshops that have added another layer to rehearsals and partly because of the sheer willingness of the cast and crew to support each other, experiment, take risks and work jolly hard to mine every last ounce of comedy from this very silly show. Added to which the newly created band have thrown themselves wholeheartedly into music of the skiffle band era and perfected the art of playing 'Beatles style'.

We have had such fun over the past few months, have laughed with and at each other and are delighted to bring you this most joyful of shows. I would particularly like to thank Pip Block for her commitment to One Man Two Guvnors until she took 'Break a Leg' too literally three weeks before opening night, and the irrepressible Robyn Donnelly who has made the role of Rachel her own.

Robyn's first time on stage was in Bundaberg's performance of South Pacific - in her mummy's tummy. It was a natural progression from attending rehearsals in her bassinet and sleeping in green rooms during performances to participating in all aspects of entertainment. Awarded a Musical Theatre Scholarship, Robyn went on to earn an 'A' pass in the post-graduate Diploma in Drama (Auckland University) then received ACTT's Best Female Actor in a Leading Role for 2014.





Scott Hayden

Scott has been working with Company Theatre since Funny Money in 2007 in a range of roles from Captain Bertorelli in Allo Allo to sell-out runs as Basil Fawlty in Fawlty Towers and More Fawlty Towers'. Scott has also covered more serious fare, having played Colonel Nathan Jessup in A Few Good Men, Philip Lombard in And Then there were None, Gerald Croft in An Inspector Calls and Cedric "Charlie" Charlton in The Darling Buds of May. Outside of theatre, Scott has also appeared in national and international television commercials and he co-hosts the Admiralty Entertainment Youtube Channel.



Mark Jensen

Mark appeared earlier this year in the Company Theatre production of When Dad Married Fury. He enjoyed it so much that he is back, this time in the role of East End gangster Charlie the Duck. "I love playing villains, and Charlie the Duck is also a bit of a clown which makes it a lot of fun".



Toutai Palu

Toutai made his theatrical debut in 2014 in 'Ladies Night', and has acted with Auckland University, Pilgrim Productions and Harlequin Musical Theatre since then, particularly enjoying the role of Duane Wilson in 'Harvey' which won an ACTT award for outstanding comedy. He enjoys being part of the Company Theatre family, thinks this play is absolutely hilarious and hopes you enjoy his portrayal of the role of Lloyd Boateng.

Steve Wright

Steve has over thirty years stage and screen experience including professional roles in Hercules and Xena Warrior Princess. A geriatric OE to England gave him the opportunity to take on roles in outdoor Shakespeare plays in Oxford; back in New Zealand favourite recent performances have been in Roger Hall's A Shortcut to Happiness and Who wants to Live to be a Hundred, and last year Steve received an ACTT award for his portrayal of George Pye in Humble Boy for Torbay Theatre.



George Maunsell

George has been in love with theatre from a young age, and has participated in several shows such as The Taming of the Shrew and Macbeth, and competitions such as the young performer of the year and the Sheila Winn Shakespeare festival. He has recently been travelling the UK and NZ to approach drama schools.



Tor Hardie

At the age of thirteen Tor was given his first guitar and has played for and fronted many bands, touring England and Europe with original material and cover songs. He was a familiar face at the Marquee Club in London in the 70's and released a number of singles in the 80's and 90's. Highlights of his musical career include playing with Blue Weaver of the Bee Gees and spending an evening with May Axton the co-writer of Heartbreak Hotel. Tor was introduced to Company Theatre through the Rose Singers with whom he sings and plays the guitar.





Rob Hay

It may have been a low level mid-life crisis that prompted Rob to start learning the bass guitar ten years ago. Since then he has played in several local garage bands and also played regularly in a band at Devonport's Holy Trinity church where he is a music leader. Always a lover of 60s music, being in the band for OneM2Gs was too good an experience to miss. It will be Rob's first involvement in a theatre production since high school.



Dave Mills

Dave has enjoyed the Auckland music scene for the last eleven years, having previously played in London with various bands. Although he started his musical career just after 1963 when One Man Two Guvnors is set, he can't help enjoying the music of this time and appreciating its importance. "To play with these band members and cast is an honour and above all a lot of fun."



Gib Williamson

Gib learnt to play the guitar in a combo band on board ship in the merchant navy, playing all over America, Canada, the Philippines and in Africa "just to see the girls really"! He jumped ship in Sydney just as the British music scene was hitting the airwaves and toured Australia with various bands. He came to New Zealand in 1964 playing in 'Judge Wayne and the Convicts', appearing on TV and playing alongside Sandie Shaw and The pretty Things, playing on TV and round the clubs – Delmonico's in Northcote, the Takapuna RSA, the Galaxy, the Pink Pussycat, the Monaco in Federal Street, the Shiralee, the Oriental Ballroom and at a jazz club in the High Street, also recording their own 'small chart topper'.
