

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The Director Director's Note



Kathy Gent

This is the thirteenth production that Kathy has directed for Company Theatre, following the box office successes of Fawlty Towers, More Fawlty Towers, Calendar Girls, Brassed Off and 'Allo 'Allo. She absolutely loves directing comedies, especially plays with strong characters and just a touch of melancholy. Before arriving in New Zealand in 1995, she directed revues, plays and pantomimes for companies in Sheffield, Leicester, Portsmouth and London with all-time favourites being Cabaret and Stepping Out.

Originally written for Hull Truck Theatre Company, Ladies Day has been produced by many theatre companies since its premiere in 2005. There are many good reasons for this, not least because it offers four brilliant substantial parts for women. There are men too, in fact the script suggests that all six male roles can be played by one actor. However I decided against this as the play really does focus on the women and to risk bringing more attention to one male actor would imbalance the piece. I was also lucky enough to have talented men audition for the production to play the small but lovely and important male roles.

In 2005 Ascot racecourse was being refurbished and so the whole Summer event of Royal Ascot was relocated to York racecourse which provided the stimulus for the story of four women working in a fish plant in Hull putting on their best hats and setting off to Ladies Day. Taken away from their normal relentless routine and into an unfamiliar and glamorous environment, they have the chance to pursue their own dreams and ambitions – be that meeting Tony Christie, rubbing shoulders with celebrities in the hope of making it as a star, catching a glimpse of the Queen or taking one last shot at a dream which is almost over. In their own ways, the ladies are all close to a boundary in their own lives and either pushing to break through or anxiously holding back. By the end of the play, nothing will ever be the same again.

This has really been a very happy rehearsal process and is a testament to the gorgeous people on board both on stage and back stage. We've had fun playing with ways to show the essence of a fish factory (complete with the smell of very smelly fish boxes from the fish market), discovering the bookie's tic-tac signals and immersing ourselves in the music of Tony Christie whose songs are the inspiration for the choice of racing horses and feature heavily between scenes in the play. The Hull accent has posed no problem to the actors under the wonderful coaching of Laura Naylor but has instead provided humour when discussing 'cans of kirk' and 'Er my Gerd'. It didn't take long for Amanda Whittington's wonderfully drawn characters to emerge and speak for themselves and I was soon convinced of this play's warm heart.

The cast and crew have had a ball rehearsing this show and we wish you the same joy in watching it.

Suzy, a professional actor, director and producer, trained at LAPA and RADA in London, the Stella Adler Academy in NY and TVI Studios in LA. She has been acting for TV, Stage and Screen for over 15 years and her company Twice as Good Productions has produced theatre in London, Prague, Hong Kong Australia and NZ. Recent stage roles include Titania, Jaques, Simonides and Lady Macbeth in Shakespeare's plays, Anne Hathaway in her award winning one woman show Shakespeare's Will and Elizabeth in Carl Nixon's The Birthday Boy. She is delighted to be working with Company Theatre for the first time on this lovely comedy that also pulls at the heartstrings.



Katie Vincent - Linda

Katie Fullard - Shelley

Katie is an English actress and has worked in touring theatre, fringe festivals, film and youth theatre for twenty years. She came to New Zealand four years ago from the UK and has had varying roles in the Legacy Project and more recently How to be Happy and The Graduate. In the UK Katie has been Co-creative Director of Define Theatre and Kaebide Theatre performing in productions such as: Henceforward; Can't Pay, Won't Pay; Love Song; Low Level Panic & Mistro Buffo to name a few. She has helped devise, directed and produced for Children's Youth Theatre. After completing a degree Katie trained with Neale Birch at Derby Acting Academy for 5 years.



Rob Campion - Joe

Ladies Day is Rob's third play under Kathy's direction. In his first play, Fawlty Towers, Rob played three different characters and from there a passion developed for live theatre. In 2016 and 2017 Rob was nominated for best male actor in a leading role (Kings of the Gym) and best supporting male actor (Gaslight) in the ACTT awards. Since 2012, Rob has performed in 13 plays. Ladies Day rehearsals have been hilarious and he knows you as the audience will LOVE it!



James Carrick - Jim

A natural entertainer with years of experience in standup comedy and as an accomplished guitarist, James only recently dipped his toe into community theatre to be rewarded with leading roles in Humble Boy for Torbay Theatre, Off the Hook and Move Over Mrs Markham for Phoenix Theatre and One Man Two Guvnors for Company Theatre.



Steve Wright - Barry

Steve has over thirty years' stage and screen experience including professional roles in Hercules and Xena Warrior Princess/ A geriatric OE to England gave him the opportunity to take on roles in outdoor Shakespeare plays in Oxford; back in New Zealand favourite recent Company performances have been in Roger Hall's a Shortcut to Happiness, Who wants to be a Hundred and One Man Two Guvnnors



Skyler Van Daal - Patrick/Ted

Skyler has performed in the musicals Les Miserables and Guys & Dolls, and in many short films and student film projects as a student at South Seas Film & Television School in 2016.He works as a communications consultant for Spark during the day, but outside of that loves performing and entertaining especially on stage. He has really enjoyed working alongside the girls during rehearsals, with their great sense of humour' that has really brought the play to life. A big challenge for Skyler has been working with an Irish accent, but it has really helped him bring out the character that is Patrick


