

PRESIDENT OF COMPANY THEATRE



## THOUGHTS ON THE PLAY from Kristof Haines

DIRECTOR OF 'STONES IN HIS POCKETS'

I first stumbled across the script for *Stones in His Pockets* many years ago, and from the minute Charlie tries to scab an extra lemon meringue pie from the film set catering van I was hooked. This play is many things: funny, touching, cynical, hopeful - but above all it is unashamedly, joyously human. Although *Stones* is set in Ireland and is



very much an Irish play, this is a story packed with universal truths and moments which will be relatable to just about everyone, no matter where you're from. Seeking a fresh start, making unexpected new friendships, struggling with depression, finding a new purpose in life... these are, whether we like it or not, keystone human experiences and *Stones in His Pockets* brings them to light with real warmth and poignancy. This is not really a story about somewhere or someone else, about "them". This is a story about us.

# THE SETTING

Stones in His Pockets takes place in a small town in County Kerry, Ireland. While the time period is never explicitly mentioned, we can gather that it's set sometime in the 90's. Irish rural communities are struggling with major changes to their way of life, the Troubles have not yet ended, and local video rental stores are beginning to be pushed out of business by chain brands like Xtra-vision and Blockbuster. This production is divided into two acts, with one interval.





# **(RISTOF HAINES**

Director of Stones in His Pockets Kristof has been carefully nursing a theatrical addiction for the last seven years or so, and has no plans to get clean any time soon. His first experience with Company Theatre was back in 2012, when he was pulled in last minute to play an affronted German tourist (Don't talk about the war!) in Kathy Gent's first Fawlty Towers


production, and he has since appeared onstage at the Rose Centre a number of times in both independent and **Company Theatre** productions. While he's taken to the Rose stage as characters ranging from a happy-go-lucky sex enthusiast to a (figuratively and literally) tortured artist, this is his first time directing for **Company Theatre**.

# MEET THE CAST

FRANCIS JOHNSON Francis Johnson is a year 13 student at Takapuna Grammar, where he has performed in their school productions of *Grease, As You Like It*, and *Little Women* over the past 3 years. He is performing for the second time with *Company Theatre*, the first being as Wayne Hudson in last year's production of Popcorn. Francis has just completed a season at the Auckland Fringe Festival in the play *This is How We're Gonna Die* and has loved the challenge of taking on his first two-person show.



#### NATASHA KAY SENIOR

Natasha Kay Senior is a 29 year old actress from South Yorkshire, England. After graduating with BA Hons Drama at the University of Huddersfield, Natasha immersed herself in the Auckland theatre scene, first working with *Stray Theatre Company* in *Revengers Tragedy* and as Dromio of Ephesus and Dromio of Syracuse in *A Comedy of Errors*. In 2018, Natasha performed in the immersive *Speakeasy* as Yorkshire and found herself subject to experimental theatre torture in *The* 

*Faustus Project* as Dr. Faustus at the Basement Theatre. She performed two years in a row at Auckland Fringe Festival; *The Good The Bad and The Meeting*, directed by Jim Cawthorne and as Launce in *Two Gentlemen of Verona*, directed by Alex Bonham. Natasha is no stranger to challenging, physically demanding performances and can't wait to add this gem of a play to her repertoire.

# MARIE JONES

Playwright of Stones in His Pockets

Sarah Marie Jones OBE (born 1951) is a Belfastbased actress and playwright. Born into a working-class Protestant family, Jones was an actress for several years before turning her hand to writing. Her plays have been staged on Broadway in New York as well as in Northern Ireland.

She helped found the *Charabanc Theatre Company*, an all-women touring group. It was created to help counteract the lack of roles for women, and which produced a series of collaboratively written original works. The group's first play, *Lay Up Your Ends*, based on a strike by mill girls in the early part of the 20th century, was an immediate hit. She remained with Charabanc until 1990 when she left and co-founded the *Dubbeljoint Theatre Group* in 1991. She wrote five plays for the *Replay Theatre Company*, including *Under Napoleon's Nose* (1988). The play for which she may be best-known is *Stones in His Pockets*, a play based on the idea of a Hollywood film company filming a movie in a small Irish village and the resulting impact on that community. This was performed on Broadway to critical acclaim.

## Hollywood comes to Devonport via Ireland

A slice of Ireland is coming to the Rose Centre in the form of Irish tragi-comedy, Stones in his Pockets.

The Company Theatre production is set in Ireland and the actors perform speaking in Irish accents.

Director Kristof Haines says the play, written by Marie Jones, is many things: funny, touching, cynical, hopeful and, above all, unashamedly human

It is a story which will resonate with just about everyone, he says. "Seeking a fresh start, making unexpected new friendships, struggling with depression, finding a new purpose in life, these are, whether we like it or not, keystone human experiences and Stones in his Pockets brings them to light with real warmth and poignancy.'

The play centres around two friends from County Kerry, Charlie Conlon and Jake Quinn, employed as extras on a Hollywood film.

Conlon has aspirations to get his own script made into a movie. Quinn has recently returned from New York and is mesmerised. along with everyone else, by the star of the initially excited at the opportunity to be a part of a major film and distracted by the novelty. Stones in his Pockets has won numerous awards.

The two actors in the play, Natasha Kay Senior and Francis Johnson, play 15 characters between them.

Francis lives in Devonport and is in his final year at Takapuna Grammar School. He wants to study drama, having been hooked on theatre since he started acting in Geoff Allen's classes at Devonport Drama at the age of eight.

Fellow actor Senior comes from Barnsley in the United Kingdom

Francis says Stones in his Pockets is the most challenging production he has been in, because of the number of lines, the concentration of being on stage throughout and the precision needed to play eight characters, most of whom are Irish.

Francis was nominated for an Auckland Community Theatre Trust Award for the best male in a lead role for his portrayal of Wayne in Popcorn by Ben Elton last year.

He started working backstage for Company Theatre on One Man Two Guvnors and Ladies' Day, when he says he was too shy to talk to anyone. Now he is on the committee and loves the fact that community theatre is all about combining with all sorts of people - actors, directors, stage managers, tech people.

Of Stones in his Pockets, Francis says, "It pretends to be about nothing much, yet it's really about struggling to find your place in




