

Thank you for coming along to see "Out of Order", the first play of Company Theatre's 2025 season at the Rose Centre! With it revolving around the strangely familiar subject of a philandering, dishonest politician, our cast of ten turns this into comedy gold – backed up by the clear vision & purpose of director Reg Williams, and a hotel-room window which clearly has ideas of its own.

For August, we welcome back director Anthony Whitehouse: Helming comedic spy thriller "The 39 Steps" after a 23-year gap since directing Company Theatre's "The Sex Fiend". On mention of that title, our current production's lying, cheating government minister Richard ('Dick') Willey – acted expertly by Matt Smith – wouldn't get far without his long-suffering secretary George Pigden: Who often appears on the verge of a nervous breakdown, for which we're all relieved Zac Russell doesn't rely on method acting. The rest of the cast have also mastered this play's comedy, and the crew have been invaluable as always.


Zac has been involved in theatre in Auckland for over 20 years.

Recent work as a director elsewhere includes The Crucible, 12 Angry Men, Evita and A Streetcar Named Desire, all for Centrestage Theatre. Favourite roles elsewhere include Frank Educating Rita, Kipps A Woman in Black, George Same Time Next Year and Freddie Noises Off. Classical roles for Cliveden Festival Company include Petruchio and Mercutio, and he toured with Ubiquitous Theatre Company appearing in Jeffrey Bernard is Unwell and The Killing Game.

He teaches drama preparing students for Trinity College (London) qualifications to diploma level.



Introducing Ray Cooney

Ray Cooney is today recognised theatrically and publicly as 'The Master of Farce' and a most worthy successor as an author to the great Ben Travers, and as a director/ actor to Brian Rix. A most prolific writer of stage farces/comedies of high standards which have not only graced the stages of English speaking countries for more than 40 years. Ray Cooney earned an international reputation as the finest living writer of this form of theatre, and professional and amateur artists have benefited from his writing genius and influence as well as an actor/director. Charles Spencer – the doyen of theatre critics – wrote of Funny Money, 'Ray Cooney is a National Treasure'.

Ray began his theatrical career in 1946 at the age of 14 in SONG OF NORWAY at the Palace Theatre. Between 1946 and 1950, he appeared in "Calcutta in the Morning", and "The Hidden Years" plus "Treasure Island", "Peace comes to Peckham", "The Winslow Boy" and "The Guinea Pig" in tours and repertory Companies around

the UK. Following National Service (50-52), he had many acting roles in weekly Rep and Tours until joining the Brian Rix Company at the Whitehall Theatre in 1956. He began his writing career by writing "One for the Pot" with Tony Hilton that premiered at the Whitehall Theatre in 1961. While this ran until 1965, Ray wrote "Chase me Comrade", which also premiered at the Whitehall Theatre in 1964 and ran for 3 years. He co-wrote "Charlie Girl" (1964) with John Chapman along with five other plays over the following decade. He then devised the musical "Elvis" in 1977 which won the Evening Standard best musical award, followed by the play "Her Royal Highness" (1981). Then came Ray's biggest hit, "Run For Your Wife" in 1982. This was then followed by two further plays until he write his awar winning "Out of Order" in 1990, which won the Laurence Oliver award for best comedy. Between 1990 and 2011, he wrote or collaborated on a further six productions including with his son, Michael. It's estimated that over 100 million tickets have been sold throughout the world for Ray Cooney comedies!

In 1992, Ray bought the Playhouse Theatre in London. That year he staged the West End premiere of his latest farce "It Runs In The Family" at the Playhouse. This was followed by "Jane Eyre" (1993) adapted by Fay Weldon and starring Tim Pigott-Smith, Frederick Lonsdale's "On Approval" (1994) starring Simon Ward, Martin Jarvis and Anna Carteret, and Ray's "Funny Money" in 1995.

Ray says he keeps fit, partly by swimming, playing tennis and gardening but mainly, by appearing in his own hectic plays!

He was awarded the O.B.E. (Order of the British Empire) in the 2005 Queen's New Years Honours List for his services to drama.

Ray has been married to his lovely wife, Linda, since 1962 and they have two sons. Danni, who lives in Australia, where he looks after Ray's business interests in Australasia, the Far East and Russia and Michael, who lives in Los Angeles and is a successful play and screenwriter in his own right.

Danni has two children, Jess and Ashlea (recently married). Michael (married to actress Jessica Collins) has three kids, Oliver, Spencer and Jemma. Ray and Linda make sure they see their two sons and the five grand-children by doing the round-the-world trip at least once a year. Ray usually manages to combine these trips with directing and Acting in both Adelaide and Los Angeles!

Ray' and Linda's extended family also includes most of the feline population of Essex as well as everything else that strays into his garden from nearby Epping Forest. The pet shops of Epping would go out of business if Ray moved from the area!
